**Tabling of Public Hearing on Ordinance for Final Adoption:**

**Ordinance #2020-05** an Ordinance of the Township of Montville, County of Morris, and State of New Jersey to promote the adequate supply of Affordable Housing in the Township by extending the minimum Affordability Control periods on all Affordable Rental Units situated in the Rachel Gardens Condominium Development

Due to the Ordinance pertaining to the extension of affordability controls on existing Affordable Housing units at Rachel Gardens beyond the December 2021 expiration. Due to ongoing communications with Fair Share Housing and the attorney for Rachel Gardens, Township Attorney Fred Semrau recommended that the Township Committee table the public hearing on Ordinance #2020-05 until June 30, 2020 to allay concerns about holding the hearing during the COVID-19 State of Emergency.

**Reports:**

1. Administrator's report

- Administrator Victor Canning reported that the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) continues to monitor the COVID-19 response and how the Township will implement the recommendations from Governor Murphy's 6-point plan as details emerge.
- He also asked the listening public to not flush disposable wipes into the sewer system due to the costly damage to Township sewer equipment.
- Administration reviews essential employee staffing with Township department heads on a weekly basis.
- He advised that residents could track COVID-19 updates on the Township website and at [www.covid19.nj.gov](http://www.covid19.nj.gov)

2. Attorney's report

- Mr. Semrau stated the Township personnel continue to work during the current state of emergency
- He reserved other items for the closed executive session

3. Township Committee liaison reports and comments

Chairman Cooney

- Mr. Cooney thanked the Administration, Police Department and OEM team for their timely responses and efforts during the COVID-19 crisis.
- He advised that he, Committeeman Kayne and Committeeman Conklin would be at the Kirwanis Food Pantry on Thursday to help distribute zero-contact food packages to residents

in need. He expressed the Township Committee's concern for residents who have financial hardships and urged them to accept help without feeling shame.

Committeeman Kayne

- Mr. Kayne said that while Boards and Commissions are not meeting, the Board of Health has stayed active in following COVID-19 developments.
- He cautioned the public to continue to adhere to shelter-at-home and social distancing as the weather improves.
- He stated his appreciation and pride in the Montville community for their many acts of service.
- He mentioned that three members of the Township Committee would be helping at the Kiwanis Food Pantry on Thursday.

Committeewoman Witty

- Mrs. Witty thanked the community and Township Administration for their response during the COVID-19 crisis.
- The V.F.W. still hopes to celebrate its 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on September 12.

Deputy Mayor Cook

- Mr. Cook advised the public that the Morris County Department of Health is operating a COVID-19 testing center at County College of Morris for Morris and Sussex County residents. The center operates Monday through Friday by appointment. A doctor's referral is required. The center is presently not operating to its full capacity of 300. Mr. Cook directed residents to the COVID-19 patient testing website: <https://health.morriscountynj.gov/COVIDTesting>

Committeeman Conklin

- Mr. Conklin thanked the employees carrying on Township business under the COVID-19 state of emergency. He expressed condolences to the families with bereavements.

### **Old Business:**

#### 1. Project status report

Committeeman Kayne asked whether the replacement of the existing Windsor Tank was still expected to be completed in the 2020 calendar year.

Assistant Administrator Hercek responded that in light of the proposed Avalon Bay and Mill Creek projects, Administration recommends a review of the present plan to replace the Windsor Tank with a bolted steel tank to determine whether the plan needs to be reconfigured for the anticipated increased water demand. A resolution to study the project further is being drafted for the May 12, 2020 Township Committee meeting.

Administration agreed to Committeeman Conklin's request to include tentative completion dates or milestone dates on the Project Status Report where possible.

### **Public Portion**

Motion by Witty second by Conkling to open public portion. All in favor. Motion approved.

Henry Bernstein, 12 Breton Drive. He asked whether a summary of COVID-19 activities could be published to the public on an ongoing basis. He also asked whether there was oversight of COVID-19 food safety practices by the Township Health Department of restaurants who are operating curbside and/or food deliveries. He asked whether the number of Montville residents who have died of COVID-19 is known and whether the rate of infection is leveling off.

Administrator Victor Canning responded that the Township website is updated with COVID-19 information and the Department of Health’s webpage contains information and links to the County, State and Center for Disease Control (CDC) websites. Updates are also being shared via the Township’s social media. Mr. Canning did not have specifics on the Health Department’s oversight of food-handling and asked Mr. Bernstein to call the office with his contact information so Administration could follow up on the question. He advised that demographic information on New Jersey COVID-19 is at the state level and not known to municipalities. He stated that the bereavements reported in today’s meeting were through notification by the families of the deceased. Not all were COVID-19 deaths.

Chairman Cooney directed the public to the New Jersey website on COVID-19 at [www.covid19.nj.gov](http://www.covid19.nj.gov).

Cheryl Cavanaugh, 108 Pine Brook Road. She thanked the Township for keeping the community informed during the COVID-19 crisis.

WHEREAS, the Township Engineering Department has prepared plans and specifications related to the road resurfacing work; and

WHEREAS, the Taylortown Road Resurfacing Project must be placed out for public bid.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Montville, in the County of Morris, and State of New Jersey, that the Township Administration and Engineering Department are hereby authorized to move forward with soliciting bids for the Taylortown Road Resurfacing Project, Phases I & II.

**Resolution #2020-146** resolution authorizing Liquor License Renewal – Janlu, LLC

WHEREAS, Resolution #2019-288, which was adopted on October 22, 2019, at a Regular Meeting of the Township Committee rescinded the renewal of liquor license #1421-32-014-009, licensee Janlu, LLC,. due to the State of New Jersey Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control's ("ABC") requirement that the licensee submit an application for a Special Ruling pursuant to N.J.S.A. 33:1- 12.39 due to the license having become inactive; and

WHEREAS, the liquor license holder submitted the application for a 12.39 Special Ruling approving the from the ABC; and

WHEREAS, the ABC issued a Special Ruling authorizing the renewal of liquor license #1421-32-014-009;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Township Committee of the Township of Montville, County of Morris and State of New Jersey hereby authorizes the renewal of liquor license #1421- 32-014-009, licensee Janlu, LLC, for the license term 2019-2020.

**Resolution #2020-147** resolution urging the State of New Jersey to provide direct stabilization funding to Morris County from the Coronavirus Relief Fund

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Township Committee of Montville Township in the County of Morris, one of the 39 municipalities within Morris County, New Jersey, supports the following:

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 Pandemic has severely impacted the population and economy of the entire world; and

WHEREAS, the County of Morris has to date been severely impacted by this virus with 309 residents who have lost their life thus far during this crisis; and

WHEREAS, due to this pandemic the County of Morris has had to undertake immediate plans of action to both identify those individuals infected with the virus and to initiate unanticipated costly yet critical strategic plans relative to the prevention of the continued spread of the virus inclusive of but not limited to:

- Initiated the Morris County Office of Emergency Management and Public Health Response staff efforts beginning in late February.
- Established outside COVID-19 testing sites at Morristown Medical Center, Chilton Hospital, Dover General Hospital, St. Clare's Hospital, and the Zufall Clinic helping to ensure that potentially infected individuals remain outside the perimeter of those critical facilities.
- Contracted with an Epidemiologist.
- Established a COVID-19 testing site at the County College of Morris last month with no support of personal protection equipment, testing kits, or other materials from the State of New Jersey as supplied to other Counties.
- Supported the needs of both the Atlantic HealthCare Hospital System and the Prime HealthCare Hospital System.
- Accepted and medically treated out of County adult inmates, juvenile offenders, and Children in Crisis, in the respective Morris County facilities, resulting in the spread of the virus within the County's Correctional Facility, Juvenile Detention, and Youth Shelter operational staff, further resulting in significant staff illness, significant overtime costs, and significant sanitizing costs.
- Stretched professional resources beyond the realm of reasonability by serving as the Medical Examiner for three Counties.
- Required to accept over 60 COVID-19 positive residents of long-term care facilities from outside of Morris County as directed by the New Jersey Department of Health.
- Established multiple temporary morgues within the various hospitals.
- Responding to the increased demand and associated costs relative to the Morris County 911 Communication Center, processing over 8,132 calls since the initial Executive Order 104.
- Processing, responding to, and incurring the related costs to over 1,937 EMS emergencies of which 901 were determined to be potential COVID-19 responses, requiring full personal protection equipment since the beginning of the pandemic.
- Established and supporting temporary housing facilities for Community Based Human Service residential providers addressing the needs of the Homeless, Division of Developmental Disabilities, and Behavioral Health populations.
- Redirected the Senior Nutrition Program from a congregate and home-delivered operation to solely home-delivered operation, significantly increasing operational costs.
- Continuing to provide life-sustaining transportation services via the County's paratransit program, placing staff at considerable risk as well as incurring significant sanitizing expenses relative to all transportation vehicles.
- Addressed the increased demand for Temporary Assistance services to increased applications for programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), while dealing with reduced staff due to COVID-19 and office closures to sanitize their space.

- Because the Federal Government's emergency stockpile of personal protective equipment was depleted and understanding that the State would not be receiving further shipments, required us to expend exorbitant funds to purchase said personal protective equipment for local healthcare and first responder disciplines.
- Provided Emergency Funding to the four local Food Pantries that operate five days per week.
- Provided Hazard Pay to first responders and front-line staff.
- Established a secure facility for homeless positive COVID-19 individuals who do not require hospitalization, to recover from the virus.
- Further, within this secure facility for homeless COVID-19 individuals, ensured the provision of medical, nutritional, transportation and social services; and

WHEREAS, \$3.44 billion has been allocated to the State of New Jersey from the Coronavirus Relief Fund, established by the CARES Act, which was signed into law by the President on March 27, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Fund provides a direct payment to the State of New Jersey, as well as provided over 1 Billion Dollars of direct payments to New Jersey counties with populations greater than 500,000 individuals; and

WHEREAS, Morris County, with a population that is just 1.6% below the threshold of 500,000, is not expected to receive a direct payment from the federal government, and thus will have to rely solely on a share of the state's allotment; and

WHEREAS, elected officials representing Morris County including Congresswoman Sherrill, Senator Codey, and Senator Bucco have expressed this inequity to the State of New Jersey.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Montville of the County of Morris, strongly urges the State of New Jersey to provide direct stabilization funding to Morris County from the Coronavirus Relief Fund in an amount consistent with the allocation made to counties that have populations slightly over 500,000, by utilizing the formula applied through the CARES Act. This funding is critical to Morris County's ability to continue its efforts to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic and work to keep our constituents safe.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the federal government adopt an aid funding threshold reflecting the true impact of COVID-19 for all future allocations, based on metrics indicative of the negative effects the virus has had on jurisdiction and the level of actions taken to combat the threats.

This resolution should be shared with the President of the United States Donald J. Trump, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi, and the Leaders of the United States Senate Mitch McConnell and Chuck Schumer, United States Senators Cory A. Booker and Robert Menendez, Congresswoman Mikie Sherrill and Congressman Tom Malinowski. This resolution should also be shared with the Governor of the State of New Jersey and New Jersey legislative representatives to the County of Morris. Additionally, the resolution should be shared with the New Jersey Association of Counties for distribution to all of the counties in the State of New Jersey and all of the mayors of municipalities within Morris County.

This Resolution will take effect immediately.

**Resolution #2020-148** Tax Identification Statement

WHEREAS, The Recycling Enhancement Act, P.L.2007, chapter 311, has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, There is levied upon the owner or operator of every solid waste facility (with certain exceptions) a recycling tax of \$3.00 per ton on all solid waste accepted for disposal or transfer at the solid waste facility.

WHEREAS, Whenever a municipality operates a municipal service system for solid waste collection, or provides for regular solid waste collection service under a contract awarded pursuant to the "Local Public Contracts Law", the amount of grant monies received by the municipality shall not be less than the annual amount of recycling tax paid by the municipality except that all grant moneys received by the municipality shall be expended only for its recycling program.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Montville that the Township of Montville hereby certifies a submission of expenditure for taxes paid pursuant to P.L.2007, chapter 311, in 2019 in the amount of \$27,214.41. Documentation supporting this submission is available at the Township of Montville Municipal Building, 195 Changebridge Road, Montville, NJ 07045 and shall be maintained for no less than five years from this date.
